Study Update

- We have now received **individual participant data from 27 trials** and are currently mapping all the variables and coding the data. Thank you so much for your contributions!

- We have recently formed working groups to explore weight stigma during weight management interventions and the interpretation of dietary restraint as part of EDIT.

Intervention Deconstruction (study 4)

- Coding of intervention components for trials included in the EDIT Collaboration is almost complete.
- PhD candidate Rabia Khalid and EDIT co-lead Dr Natalie Lister will begin verification procedures this month – this includes contacting trial representatives to confirm coding for their interventions.


EDIT Collaboration at Conferences


